A lot of informal education goes on that maybe they don't get at school. It's their time, their space to be themselves with their friends.





Grace Harvey, March 1923 to March 2007

Grace's mother died when she herself was only seven, and she took on the responsibility of caring for her father and brother Jack which she did without complaint. Those close to her say she never did complain at what life brought her.

Leaving school at 14, Grace started work as a kitchen maid at Woodhall in Shottisham at 15 while continuing to look after the men of her family. She was known as an extremely hard worker and she rose to the position of cook. This was now wartime, and at 19 Grace began work at Letchworth, assembling scientific instruments for the War Office, returning in 1944 with a glowing reference.

On her return home she met again with Bob Harvey whom she had known at school and they were married in 1947. They came to Grundisburgh to live next to the village hall in Laundry Cottage (now no more) as Bob worked for Mrs Bull, daughter of 'the old' Lord Cranworth. There their son

Robert and daughter Jean (now Marsh) were born and later they moved

around the corner to No 8 Park Cottages where their youngest son Allen was born.

Grace joined the WI and often helped out at the cake stall at the show. In those days it was held on the parkland opposite the cottages on Park Road. Laughingly Grace would recall the occasion when, having set up the stall and arranged the cakes carefully, a sudden fierce squall of wind overturned the table and its goods onto the ground. Since the park was daily frequented by a herd of cows the cakes were now covered in a less

than tempting topping!

Maintaining her reputation for hard work, Grace took on various cleaning jobs in the village as well as working in the fields picking fruit and potatoes. As many had to be, Grace was a careful house-keeper and Jean tells how her mother would walk to the local farm to buy her pint of milk rather than pay the extra half penny to buy it from the roundsman.

After work Grace enjoyed nothing more than spending time with Bob and the children - cycling to Ipswich to see the stockcars, scrambling or speedway.

As the years passed Grace's family grew with six grandchildren (Julie, Gary, Mark, Lee, Joanne and Sam). When Bob retired he and Grace moved to Otley where they made many new friends. Grace loved car-boot sales and most weekends could be found browsing a car-boot somewhere in Suffolk. As she became less mobile Grace enjoyed doing crosswords and watching television - especially the soaps - and

liked a good gossip with Jean about her favourite characters and their activities.

Three other additions to her family - great grandchildren Joshua, Alicia and Katie - completed the shape of the family of this loyal, loving wife and mother, caring and giving grandmother and great-grandmother.


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UPDATE FROM RURAL ROADS CAMPAIGN

Three traffic safety surveys have now been commissioned by SORR (Save Our Rural Roads) from consultants of the Freight Transport Association.

The reports on the B1078 (at Coddenham) and the C309 (through Bredfield, Boulge and Debach) have been completed and the results are a clear indictment of the dangers along these roads. They will be posted on the SORR website (www.sorr.org.uk).

The third survey covered the B1079 from the Wyevale roundabout through Hasketon, Grundisburgh, Burgh and Clopton to the junction with the B1078. It was undertaken on Monday 21 May, and the report will be available at the end of the month.

This survey was made possible by a very generous donation from Grundisburgh & Culpho Parish Council.

When all three reports are available, SORR will present the full results and analysis to the county and district councils. They will provide incontrovertible evidence that we have serious problems on these roads which require a much stronger and more effective approach from the transport authority.

Already, the problems in Coddenham have been recognised and there is agreement that they need some radical and urgent action. A meeting with Suffolk County Council has been arranged for the end of May to decide what

is to be done to release this charming village from its traffic nightmare.

The campaign is receiving considerable media and press interest. There have been several articles in the East Anglian Daily Times that have prompted a vigorous debate in the letter columns. The campaign has featured on both local radio and television (and, of course, on front page of the last issue of The News).

Grundisburgh & Culpho Parish Council kindly invited Keith Gipp, Chairman of SORR, to give a presentation at its parish meeting which was well received.

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

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

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SWIMMING INTO THE BLUE IN CLOPTON

My love of swimming started at the age of four, and continued through the ranks of the Ipswich swimming club until reaching county level.

I live in Otley with my family and, after 13 years in the travel industry, decided on a new career. I gained the Amateur Swimming Association levels

1 and 2, adult and child swimming tutor qualification, along with a rescue award. This year I hope to qualify as an aquasize and a snorkling instructor as well.

After three years working in a variety of public pools in the area, I felt my classes needed more space, the sole use of a swimming pool and purpose built facilities. So with the offer of Dolphin Pool-share in Drabbs Lane, Clopton, I started 'Swim Into The Blue'. I have two assistants, my sister Louise (qualified as ASA Helper) and Kate Oxbrow (ASA Level 2 teacher) who also teaches with the Ipswich swimming club.

Keeping it in the family, my mum, Kate, works behind the scene organising all the renewals, administration, certificates and endless paperwork needed for over 100 swimmers a week!

Teaching children of all ages and abilities, I particularly enjoy teaching nervous nonswimmers and beginners. I offer a fun and friendly introduction into aquatics skills

Children are taught early water safety and, through songs and games, young children are shown the first techniques and water confidence needed for a life time love of swimming.



for older children who are interested in a better and more effective technique, lifesaving and diving.

Classes are held every Monday between 1 and 6.30pm and Thursdays 2 and 6.30pm. Class sizes are kept to a maximum of six swimmers and there is usually a teacher in the water for most of the pre-school and non swimmers' classes.

Teaching continues throughout the year breaking up only for Easter, August and Christmas.

Community council winding up through lack of support

The recent Bredfield & District Community Council's annual general meeting on 23 April had two special resolutions. Firstly there was the re-appointment of the existing executive officers, if nobody else was willing to stand; secondly to decide whether the BDCC could continue as a viable organisation.

The chairman reported that although the BDCC had joined forces with Bredfield Church to host the barn dance last October, we had not held any events of our own since March 2006, and were unable to host a Christmas fair because of lack of helpers.

Unfortunately Lynn Taylor tendered her resignation as newsletter editor in August and a replacement editor has not been found. We are grateful to her for continuing for so long despite the lack of contributions.

Since its inception in 1976 the BDCC has provided a local newsletter, organised a variety

of events and raised funds for the monthly draw and projects, in particular the village hall and play area.

The chairman said that the fact that we are not able to sustain our own newsletter, the village shop becoming independent, the severe lack of active committee members and that the three officers being well overdue for replacement, regretfully the resolution to dissolve the BDCC was necessary. He thanked everyone who had helped sustain it over many years.

A short discussion took place before the vote was taken, when it was noted that although the BDCC has around 160 members, only 21 had come along to the meeting.

The resolution to dissolve the BDCC was carried with 20 votes in favour, and one against. This fulfilled the necessary two-thirds majority required. The existing executive officers were re-elected and agreed to serve

again to help with the winding up of the organisation.

PC Gilmore said there had been three reported crimes since the last meeting: a theft of a motor vehicle (resulting in an arrest and charges), and two attempted burglaries. The new Wickham Market Rural Safer Neighbourhood Team was now in place.

Peter Carr reported on the SORR meeting on 1 May, which had included discussion of traffic management on Martlesham Road and Playford Road. A draft licence for the permissive footpath between Great and Little Bealings was being revised by SCC and works on the adjacent verge costed.

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
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

Junior TOPs shine in The Jungle Book

The production of 'The Jungle Book' in late April was my first exposure to Junior TOPs; and from my daughter's reaction it certainly won't be the last. This was true family entertainment and not just for two hours on a Saturday afternoon; thanks to this performance, I am now treated to regular shows by my four and a half years old. I also gained more insight into Rudyard Kipling's life.

To put things in perspective. The Jungle Book is not a stage production of the Disney film but more of an extract of the life of the young Kipling. Alexandra Beaumont ably portrayed the young Kipling who was persecuted by his school mates but supported by his teachers who suggest he uses too many words (!) and wrote stories for escapism.

The play opens at Kipling's school and takes us through the development of the Jungle Book as a story. Young

Mowgli (Madeliene Ling) who was captivating is lost in the jungle and adopted by the Wolf pack. He is pursued by Shere Khan (Robert Gilbert) and his side-kick, the jackal Tabaqui (Heidi Baker), who are representations of Kipling's key persecutors at school (very cleverly done well done wardrobe). Baloo (Nathan Cant) was brilliantly casted and Bagheera (Amber Hale) was a most believable panther. Lucy Robinson portrayed Mowgli grown up.

The parts were convincingly portrayed, the dancing catchy and the children held the story together excellently. I am very impressed by the calibre of Junior TOPs and the enthusiasm of the cast and parents who have supported them. Costumes, scenery and lighting should all be praised as well as, of course, direction, prompt and all the actors!

Otley's Annual Parish Meeting was held in the Village Hall on 17 April.

Chris Taylor of the community council gave an informative presentation of their plans for the much needed revitalisation of the playing field. These include a new safe play area for the youngsters along with a multi-games facility for the older children. In the short term it is hoped to install a basketball post and five a side goals. Villagers were urged to attend fund raising events to support this important project.


Christine Gough, headteacher of the primary school, reported on a lively and successful year of change following the establishment of the federation of Otley and Witnesham schools. The introduction of French teaching along with a school trip to France, which included a visit to a war cemetery, enabled the children to have a better understanding of the meaning behind Otley's new war memorial.

The meeting was also addressed by district and county councillor Peter Bellfield, along with PC Danny Wheddon of the newly formed Wickham Market Safer Neighbourhood Team, which looks after Otley and the surrounding villages.

CHURCH ORGAN RESTORED

The traditional church pipe organ, varying in size and specification, has been a feature of virtually every parish church since early Victorian times. But it is now becoming an endangered species (not unlike the organists themselves!)

St Mary's organ had been increasingly showing its age with creaks, squeaks and rattles, but primarily the bellows - the organ's lungs - were on the point of collapse.

The PCC decided to restore the organ and the contract was awarded to Holmes and Swift of Fakenham.

It was completely dismantled; pedal board and both manuals and all 726 pipes were removed, cleaned and repaired where necessary. Natural materials used included sheepskin, leather, cork and felt. A new rank of pipes was added to the Swell to give more tonal variety and the whole intricate system of trackers, stickers and thumpers reassembled in a confined space on time and to budget.

The restored organ was blessed by priest-in-charge Joy Rapley on Easter Sunday, with an opening rendition of an arrangement of the theme from the Saint Saens Organ Symphony played by Helen Jay (organ) and Tom Rogerson (piano). We now have a fine instrument which should see us through until today's Junior Church are pensioners.

The organ's interesting history was featured in News No 196.


SUFFOLK STUDIOS OPENING **DURING JUNE WEEKENDS**

Tany readers will be familiar with the Suffolk Open Studios event when artists invite people to enter their studios in weekends throughout June. Visitors will see the working surroundings of the artist and gain an insight into the creative process.

This year 180 artists and craftspeople from all corners of this large county take part. In The News' area, there are seven artists taking part. One, Edward Morgan, is a first timer and the others, the Chestnutt family, Leah Hinks and Ferial Evans, are seasoned performers.

Since retiring last year from work as a multimedia programmer, Edward returned to his roots in photography and in particular, digital photography. He says, "Whatever the medium, digital should be seen as a continuum from the analogue. Digital may offer fresh possibilities and new working methods but

the core issues and criteria remain much the same. The more I work at digital photography the more I find myself drawing on 'old' skills and judgments. However, the
