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# Chapel Field: help still needed

Grundisburgh lost the fight for Chapel Field when government planning inspector Patrick Hanna allowed the appeal by Hopkins Homes to build 70 dwellings on the field.

However 29 conditions were attached to the approval. One, condition 13, was the submission of a Construction Management Plan (CMP). The CMP contains seven sections which would have to be approved by the planning authority before any development or demolition can take place. It includes setting out defined HGV routes and timings for all deliveries to be adhered to throughout the construction period. We know

East Suffolk Council does not have the manpower to police the site. So it will be up to residents to keep eyes and ears open, cameras at the ready.

But before we get to that stage Condition 20 states that no part of the development shall be started until:

- \* the proposed surfacing improvements and links to Footpath 20 have been built;
- \* Park Road has been widened:
- \* the junctions at Ipswich Road/Park Road and Lower Road/B1079 have been improved;
- \* Plans for the passing place in Chapel Road and a cycle connection between the internal road and Chapel Road have been approved in writing by East Suffolk.



# Lorry Route Review

Initiated by parish councils, concerns can now be raised in relation to HGVs using unsuitable routes and narrow roads around Suffolk.

Communities have been approached to have their say and parish councils have submitted the top three issues affecting their area.

Locally, a request for HGV problems was circulated on Grundisburgh Google, the Grundisburgh Village Face group and Mark Rankin distributed notification leaflets to properties around the B1079. Analysing the responses the three main concerns related to Lower Road, Otley Road and Charity Lane, along with the B1079.

The issues with Lower Road, Otley Road and Charity Lane related to HGVs still using the roads, despite the presence of 'unsuitable for HGVs' signs. Also reported were: road safety for pedestrians and other road users, damage to road surface, damage to property and damage to verges because of inadequate road width. The same can be said for vehicles travelling along the B1079 plus the volume of HGVs and speeding issues.

The collated survey responses will be raised at a meeting planned for 17 February with representatives from the Suffolk Police and county councillors. # Traffic Survey

To further support the lorry route review local resident Mr Gulotti of Hill House commissioned an independent traffic survey on the B1079 Woodbridge Road in Grundisburgh. This road forms part of the southbound route for the Clopton and Debach commercial areas, as marked on the Suffolk Lorry Route Network Map.

An analysis of the data produced shows that the number of vehicles on the B1079 is up to 2,800 per day in each direction. With the number of HGVs on the B1079 being similar in both directions. Around 1 in 8 of the vehicles on the B1079 are HGVs.

Around 60% of vehicles travelling to Woodbridge were travelling at over 30mph, with up to 12 a day at over 50mph. Of the vehicles from Woodbridge around 80% were travelling at over 30mph with up to 7 per day at over 50mph. The traffic survey has been forwarded to Suffolk County Council's Lorry Route Review team.

## Highway Code

Eight changes for all types of road users have been made in the Highway Code to improve the safety of people walking, cycling and riding horses.

One major revision is the introduction of a road user hierarchy which places those most at risk in the event of a collision at the top of the hierarchy, as listed below:

- Pedestrians
- Cyclists
- · Horse riders
- Motorcyclists
- •. Cars, taxis, vans, minibuses
- Large passenger vehicles, HGVs.

This change to the Highway Code encourages all road users to share their space whilst protecting the most vulnerable but it does not remove the need for all members of the public to behave responsibly.

### **Quiet Lanes**

Tuddenham St Martin's Quiet Lane submission has, following their traffic survey, been passed for approval to be included in the WAVE 4 of the project and the full Highways consultation will follow in due course.

# Community Partnership Update

Funding for a number of road and safety projects has recently been secured for the benefit of our residents inlocal villages. This includes improvements at Gibraltar crossroads. Ashbocking (a junction described as lethal for its risk of near-miss incidents due to this section of the B1078 highway remaining at the national speed limit). Featured changes will include lowering the speed limit to 40mph, along with warning lines and signs, with the aim of keeping traffic at a safer level and making using the junction easier.

Bealings Primary pupils will be provided with high-visibility vests in a move to improve safety walking to school.

Students and families in the village walk on public roads where there is no opportunity to create a footpath
Finally, Safer Village Driving (SAVID) has been awarded funding to purchase an

additional Speed Indicator Device to share across villages, plus funding for another mobile SID which will increase the site options, bringing more villages into the scheme.

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# GRUNDISBURGH VILLAGE HALL

Grundisburgh's new village hall has been many years in the making with a huge effort made by countless people over those long years. It has involved two previous possible locations in the village before the current location proved viable.

Even with the site secured, there was a major challenge to get the finance necessary to build the hall that now stands on the site. This story has many complex and involved chapters but for these purposes it has been condensed down to a manageable size, but with apologies to those who have been involved in the many elements which have not been fully covered here.

### **Fund raising**

Fund raising is often the single most difficult stage of the building of a new community facility. We were fortunate that a planning gain agreement provided us with around £200,000 from the developers of Felgate Way, plus a 1 acre site on which to build the new hall

In addition we obtained planning consent for the construction of two detached houses on the old hall site, which gave us a further £200.000.

We made an application to the National Lottery Community Fund which took over a year to run through the process including the final submission comprising almost 30,000 words on 75 pages! We were very fortunate to obtain a grant of £200,000 from the Community Fund.

We also approached a large number of varied grant giving entities and were fortunate to obtain a total of £50,000 from The Garfield Weston Foundation, the Bernard Sunley Foundation, B&Q and others.

Probably the most satisfying part of the fund raising was the local community's efforts. An individual started the creation of a fund which then attracted a handful of others to commit a total of over £50,000 to the project. This sum was used as "match funding" for any other funds raised by the community. The effect was to double the amount raised by any local event.

This created much excitement and activity which included a village cycle ride, performances by the Grundisburgh Symphony Orchestra, cake sales, a "safari meal", a "tea dance" and numerous personal donations by generous local individuals and groups. In total, this local effort raised almost £100,000 – a huge sign of support and commitment from the local community.

In order to make it as "green" as possible, we decided upon solar panels once a kind resident offered to top up any shortfall after our local fund raising. We were delighted at the response to our public request for donations and we collected the £15,000 necessary to put a significant number of panels on the south facing roof.

### Construction

We worked with a Quantity Surveying firm (Castons) and Architects (KLH) for a number of years to produce various options for the new hall. After much research and invaluable help from our professional team, we pursued a design that had been used in Offton & Willisham as well as Monks Eleigh, but with our own tweaks and changes. We believe the new hall is a very

efficient design for the user as well as being cost effective. We were keen to be as sustainable as possible so opted for a timber framed construction with an air sourced heat pump and solar panels.

We went through a tender process to obtain quotes to build the new hall as well as offers to buy the existing hall site. The local group, DAB, won the tender and we have found them to be excellent partners in this project. They have helped us improve parts of the build as well as accommodating a number of our design tweaks during the construction. We feel very fortunate to have teamed up with David Bates and his company (DAB) as this can be the stage where costs and time can run away with you to disastrous effect.

# **Opening**

The new hall was handed over at the end of January and on our first day, we had two birthday parties booked for the one day! This immediately preceded our Open Day which was an opportunity for over 20 local groups to showcase their activities and we had several hundred people attend during the course of the event. They were keen to see the hall they had waited so long for, and we had very many compliments about the facilities.

In addition we have a formal Opening Ceremony on 5 March where the Lord Lieutenant: Clare, Countess of Euston (the Queen's representative in Suffolk) will open the new hall.

### **Coming up**

We are lucky enough to have a very busy diary with an activity taking place in the hall every weekday morning and evening. These evenings are booked by the Youth Club, the Carpet

Bowls Club, the Folk Dancing Club, GADS and the ever popular Upbeat! ladies choir. In the mornings we have some very fitness orientated groups including Pilates, Yoga and Box-Fit along with the rather more sedate Art Club which has been revived by popular demand.

Bookings are coming in thick and fast for the weekends including numerous birthday parties and a number of wedding receptions which are already booked in.

Throughout the year we will be holding some fund-raising events to ensure we are able to not only pay the regular running costs, but also build up a reserve to maintain the hall in the future.

### **Pricing**

The pricing is pretty simple with the hall costing £15 per hour and the meeting room £8 per hour except at peak times on a Friday and weekend evenings. A full card of prices is available on our website Grundisburghvillagehall.com

### Thanks

This has been an enormous effort over many years with a huge number of people putting in their time, energy and expertise to make it happen. It has shown the community has a beating heart determined to overcome many obstacles and provide Grundisburgh and the surrounding villages with a community facility to be really proud of.


# Our amazingly green village hall

Although the village hall is black on the outside, this belies its green credentials. The design of Grundisburgh's new Village Hall utilises modern construction techniques and technology to help reduce its impact on the environment. This has helped the hall achieve an A-rating on its **Energy Performance** Certificate, a near carbon neutral rating.

The most visible green measure is the 39 solar panels on the south and west facing roofs. These 14,600kWp of solar panels should generate over 14,000kWh of electricity annually, representing a carbon saving of 3 tonnes per year.

This reduces the amount of electricity the village hall will need to pay for and enables the hall to receive payments for any unused generation exported to the electricity network. When electricity is being exported some of the electricity you use at home will be coming from your new village hall!

The solar panels were an addition to the original plans and were funded through a combination of over £6,000 of

generous donations from the local community together with support and involvement of Suffolk County Council in its ambition to 'Create the Greenest County' through the Green Suffolk Fund grant, Councillor Elaine Bryce's locality grant as well as the **Enabling Communities Budget** grant from the East Suffolk councillors and Grundisburgh Parish Council's environmental

will be achieved using an airsource heat pump. This works using the same principle as a fridge or air-conditioner. You may have noticed that the air at the back of a fridge or the external vent of an airconditioner is warmer than the inside of the fridge or room being air-conditioned. This is because they use a heat transfer cycle that takes advantage of Boyles Law.

An air-source heat pump uses this principle in reverse and transforms the energy in the cold air outside into heat for the inside of the village hall. It will work down to temperatures -20°C. Heat pumps are typically 300-400% efficient over the heating season in our climate as compared to a modern gas boiler which would be about 90% efficient.

Using electricity from the grid and the solar panels together with the efficiency of the airsource heat pump will reduce the carbon footprint of the heating by at least 50% compared to a gas boiler and carbon saving of at least 1.5 tonnes per year.

Finally, the timber frame panels that were used to construct the walls of the building. Not only do these panels help to speed the build process they also lock away carbon that has been absorbed from the atmosphere while the timber was growing as opposed to releasing carbon with other building techniques. They ensure exceptional levels of insulation and have helped achieve an air tightness result 70% better than regulations require. As a result they will reduce the amount of heat lost from the building during the winter and lower the heating cost of the village hall.

Altogether, a great result for Grundisburgh and the environment.

# Developing the business plan

Early in 2020 Bryan Laxton, chairman of the village hall trustees, asked me to lead a small group to formulate a business plan for the new hall. Stephen Cooper and David Keates kindly agreed to help me and over the next 14 months we met 54 times by Zoom!

The purpose of the plan was to make projections of future costs and revenues for the new hall over the next five years, and to use these in making recommendations to the new trustees for organisational structure (reflecting the new Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) arrangement), marketing, operations, charging and cost management. Of course, the COVID

pandemic was now upon us, introducing huge uncertainties about the future, so we adopted a scenario approach to reflect a range of possible outcomes and risks.

We recognised that the new hall would be much larger than the old hall, with planted grounds, a high standard of décor and fittings and, importantly, a comfortable temperature! So costs such as maintenance, cleaning and insurance would be much higher, and while maintaining professionalism, we would need to utilise volunteers where possible. Depreciation and, in time, major maintenance would be significant.

We would therefore need an income of 2-3 times that of the

old hall. We considered historic hall usage and ways of attracting new (and former) regular and one-off users, while retaining existing village clubs and groups. High utilisation would be key to covering costs while keeping hire charges competitive. We formulated a new charging structure to reflect principles of consistency and transparency. Additional income from ongoing fund-raising would be vital to achieve overall financial balance.

Our group presented the Business Plan to the Trustees in April 2021. It was unanimously accepted and we are pleased that the new CIO Trustees are also using it as an initial working document.

# Making good on the outside

The new village hall has been lucky enough to add quickly to its sense of being established, due to the generosity of people making donations for our planting and new turf.

Susie Davis, who runs Katie's Garden, has very generously provided all the planting for the new hall site as her personal donation to the hall.

This includes over 1,000 daffodils (which were planted in January by over 20 volunteers) as well as various shrubs, perennials and trees, including some to be planted later in the spring.

The WI has also kindly donated a tree, by the gate.

They will all soon grow to provide the hall with a



beautiful backdrop to the new building.

Our original costings only allowed for the seeding of the remainder of the landscaped areas. However, after some crowd funding and a very generous single donation by a villager, we have now ordered over 1,000 sq metres of turf for the area to the south of the hall. We are very lucky that Ben Cook's students at Suffolk Rural College will be laying



the turf as part of their course work providing them with some useful and practical experience.

We hope these positive steps will quickly allow the new hall to settle into its one acre site and sit comfortably in its green environment.

# New gear in the hall

Grundisburgh's new village hall has been equipped with a range of up to date facilities which will benefit users. This includes:

### The audio/visual system

This consists of a ceiling mounted projector, an electrically powered cinema screen, surround sound, a Blu-ray disc player, an audio mixer and a dual microphone package. This system will be able to play audio CDs, DVD and Blu-ray films, presentations and slideshows, as well as linking to laptops. A film club is being planned.

### Staging

Instead of a traditional fixed stage, the hall uses modular staging which is easy to set up and dismantle when needed. Being very strong, it could even safely bear the weight of a full concert size grand piano. It can be used for stage and musical performances, weddings, business presentations and fashion catwalks.....

### The Kawai CA59 digital piano

Donated to the Grundisburgh Symphony Orchestra (GSO) by the Andrew Lloyd Webber Foundation, the piano will be used by the GSO and Upbeat! choir initially. It comes on a lockable steel trolley.

It has a number of exciting features including the ability to use it as a bluetooth speaker device which means that it can be connected to a mobile phone and have music streamed through it. Sourcing a digital piano in the pandemic posed a few challenges. The Forsyth Music Shop in Manchester were exceptionally helpful advising and supplying us with a piano to suit our needs.

# **Green Bealings**

Grundisburgh's first village walk of 2022 took us down Sandy Lane in Little Bealings and a casual conversation with a gentleman tending his property led to a wonderful discovery: two neighbours jointly managing a neglected piece of land to increase local



biodiversity.

Colin Hopkins and Jonathan Fieldsend (above) own some 1.5 acres of land that was once a sand quarry but had been left to revert to scrubland, overgrown and virtually impenetrable. Having bought the land out of auction about nine years ago and taking advice from the Suffolk Wildlife and Woodland trusts, the two have now cleared an acre of undergrowth, planted young cherry, birch, whitebeam and willow trees and coppiced old marabella plum trees and constructed a 'dead hedge' on one boundary. The former village pond has been revived and now supports abundant, diverse aquatic life including newts, frogs and toads. The woods are also being used to rewild injured or orphaned hedgehogs. Evidence of badger activity is plain but the stand-out feature of our visit (in mid-February) was bird-song: chaffinches, goldfinches, robins, tits singing at full volume and not being drowned out by road and air traffic noise - quite like lockdown times! Woodcock and tree creepers are regular

visitors and when nightingales return on migration, they are also heard here in abundance.

Running through the site is a spring-fed stream and this more or less divides the land in two - lighter and drier acidic sand higher up and shady, squelchy, peaty woodland floor lower down. This presents Colin and Jonathan with a problem: what do you do with such soggy ground with its ivyclad, old and fallen osier willows? The answer is: let more light in by removing just enough timber to encourage new growth but not to alter the essential nature of the area. That, however, is work in progress and in subsequent issues of The News, we hope to show you just how this whole project progresses, season by season.

# Cat rescue goes on

Last Spring we caried a short piece on animal rescue, particularly relating to feral cats: here is a bit more about this operation based in our area. Geogina who runs it started animal rescue in London 40 years ago, working very closely with all the big charities. She says: "I opened two charity shops which paid for all the neutering, and dealt with all the poor cats on the worst sink estates. Eventually, I was burnt out and decided to retire to Suffolk. Some hope! I have been just as busy here and the cruelty is different from inner city treatment of animals but just as prevalent. I am motivated by a sense of justice to helpless creatures who can't speak for themselves and believe that, if children can be taught kindness and responsibility towards them, and not just "want a kitten/puppy" to love without being responsible for their welfare, the world will be a better place."

Did you know that cats can contract feline AIDS and leukaemia through fighting and mating? Neutering cats over five months old can prevent this. Did you know that cats will soon have to be microchipped BY LAW?

For the last 22 years, Animal Relief Neutering has been trapping feral cats in the local area, neutering them and returning them to site, or finding other farms, stables and smallholdings in East Anglia for them to live.

In addition to this, they have 16 vets all over Suffolk on their neutering scheme, from Felixstowe to Bury St Edmunds that do very reduced-cost neutering for anyone who is struggling to pay for this essential service. In some cases they can neuter cats for free. They also have a regular supply of quality cat and dog food to give to people struggling to feed their pets that can be delivered if needed.

Animal Relief Fund (ARF) also have a microchipping service, (DEFRA registered), operated by Ria who will come to your home and chip your cats for £9.99.

They have a number of foster homes that will take stray cats or kittens, and a team of 'hand rearers' who feed baby kittens until they are weaned. They have a very high success rate with taming down semi-feral cats and kittens and in the last 18 months, ARF have neutered over 2000 cats.

They always need good quality items to sell to raise money for vets bills and need volunteers to help set traps and take the cats to the vet. If you can offer any help to us, or need our help with any of the services above, contact

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# Grundisburgh Baptist Chapel closes

It is with great sadness that we came to the united decision to close Grundisburgh Baptist Chapel. It is the end of a 224-year history.

The chapel was built in 1798 and thrived in the early years with congregations of 800 people and the planting of eight other churches. Thompson Close is named after its first pastor, John Thompson, who served here for 28 years.

However, the congregation has declined in recent times and has now become too small to be viable. We have enjoyed many lovely times here, and have been privileged to serve the community and share the wonderful message of Christ's love and salvation. Some of the highlights have been running children's and young people's meetings and the very popular Easter Egg Hunt at the Millennium Meadow. It has also been nice that we have been able to make the premises available for community groups to hire, such as the WI and the art group.

What saddens us most is that so many are missing out on what Christ could do for them because they have not yet come to faith. We hope that even the continuing presence of the building will be a reminder of



the good news that we preached here. After that the chapel has to be left empty for a year and then it will be sold by the trustees. All who met here regularly will miss each other very much, but we will be looking for other churches to join.

Many have asked what will happen to Gill and me personally. We have nothing planned as yet and we are seeking the Lord's will for the future. That will take some time, but it will probably mean that we will eventually have to move from the village – and it will be hard to leave such a lovely place!

# Norman Davis, 1938 to December 2021


Norman Davis was a gentle man with a vision and a talent for making people want to volunteer! He led by example and worked alongside volunteers, whatever the role, from cleaning to churchyard maintenance to clearing out the stream.

During his 22 years as Rector, initially of Grundisburgh and Burgh, then of Boulge and Hasketon as well, Norman Davis had a significant impact on both church and community. He made church services more relevant to the times, introduced services appropriate to a range of ages, encouraged members of the congregation to take an active part in services and developed the social life of the church. Coffee mornings, the fete, harvest suppers, the Lunch Club, walks and church picnics were all started by Norman. He and his wife, Lorna, also enabled 'Sunday Clubs' for children and teenagers and a monthly hour of singing new hymns, with a keyboard, in the Parish Room.

Alongside this he initiated a major church renovation project in Grundisburgh, kicked off by his preaching on the parable of the talents, then giving everyone £1 to use as

they wished. There is improved lighting, an audio system and floodlighting because of him.

Norman was part of the whole community, accessible to all, spending time in the school playground chatting to the children and their mums,



joining in with village events and spending time with the housebound. Norman and Lorna inspired and took part in fund raisers such as the village quiz, a village sponsored walk and a 'Mr and Mrs' competition, not forgetting his part as a member of 'Emanon' (a take off of the group the 'Three Degrees').

Norman retired in 2004. He and Lorna then moved to live in Orford, where she had spent her childhood.

# Reel Talent

Any of you whose children have attended Grundisburgh Primary School in the last few years, will know Nicola Mason who is one of the teachers there. When not trying to get year 6 kids through SATS, Nicola plays the fiddle in a folk band called SilMor.

So who are SilMor? The 'Sil' part is Garry Silbert, who plays the banjo and percussion instruments like the bodhrán.



A bodhrán is the hand held Irish drum usually beaten with a double ended stick, usually called a tipper (I have to make this educational to avoid a detention from Mrs Mason).

Gary Morling plays the guitar and mandolin. He and Nicola also sing.

Completing the line-up is Brian Barker, who plays the melodeon, more commonly known as a 'squeezebox'.



SilMor play Celtic, Irish, French and American folk tunes, plus some of their own compositions written by Gary Morling. Their sets usually comprise fast, upbeat songs and reels, rather than the more mournful 'finger in the ear' folk songs.

Some of their instruments have

a story to tell too. Garry Silbert used to be a cabinet maker by trade and turned his woodworking skills into a hobby so that he now makes his own instruments. He showed me the banjo he

made himself, from beautiful rosewood. He makes instruments for other people, including mandolins and even lutes, which are difficult because of the deep bulbous sound box, made from numerous pieces of carefully curved wood.

Nicola's fiddle was made about 100 years ago in what is now Slovakia and Brian's melodeons come from France and Germany. He has to have more than one as although the buttons allow different notes to be played, they are in a certain key signature so a change of key requires a change of instrument.



You can see these instruments in the photos and hear them in action if you follow the link to their FaceBook page via the QR code (on this page) and watch their videos.

SilMor have managed to do a gig most months since the first

lock down ended, mainly in pubs, such as The Ship at Blaxhall (shown on the video). They also play at weddings and private parties. Later this year they hope to record some of their songs and put them online. They would like to play at more folk festivals and some of the band have previously performed at the Ipswich Music Day, Snape Maltings and, in Garry's case, a tour of Denmark.

They describe their style of music as 'fast and furious', sometimes resulting in people singing noisily and dancing on tables. So just like a typical year 6 class really...
